


Home Cleaning Supplies are still being collected for those in need until Dec 1

Next Sunday we begin the Season of Advent; our time of preparation for Christmas. This Sunday marks the end of the current liturgical year. Until 1969,

Christ the King was celebrated on the last Sunday in October when it was moved to the last Sunday of Ordinary Time, where its theme of Christ's dominion made it a fitting end to the liturgical year.

When Jesus was asked by Pilate if he was a king, Jesus replied that he was a king. Yet, He was born in a poor village. His parents were not powerful or wealthy. His first visitors were the poorest of people; shepherds. He didn't associate with rich or powerful people and He never led an army into battle. He usually ate with people who were despised, ignored and rejected.

He spent his time with the poor, the sick, the broken and those who were in need of love, healing and compassion. He didn't have riches or wealth that the world thought much of; but he did share his greatest possession with us; God's love. And He asked people to take up their cross and follow him.

What are the attributes of a good shepherd? He is one who is caring and compassionate. He looks for the lost, bandages the wounded and makes the weak strong. This is the shepherd and king we are asked to follow, and whose life and example we are asked to live by. Just as he looks after and cares for each of us, so we in turn are to care for each other.

Where are we to look for and find Jesus our king today? The gospel asks us to draw on the presence of Christ who dwells within each of us through the Holy Spirit.

This gospel is not about some unknown time in the future. This gospel is about each of us and how we follow Jesus here and now in our every day lives.

On this Feast of Christ our King, both the first reading and the gospel speak about others who need our help and support. Whatever we do to and for each other, we do to and for Jesus.

Jesus is a King and we are his brothers and sisters. Therefore we belong to a royal household. As princes and princesses of a royal family, may we treat each other with dignity and respect.

As one of the early popes said, Christian, be aware of your dignity and nobility, it is God's own life that you share.
