

Shrine Update



Having received the final invoice for this summer's restoration activities the Shrine Restoration Committee is evaluating the next stages of activities. The work first started in fall of 2015 with repair of the roof over the holy family grotto, since that time we have repaired/restored not only the Shrine itself, but



all of the marble statues on the grounds, the stations of the cross plaques and the crucifixion plaques. The work only being limited by the anticipated monies that would be received that season.

We humbly thank all of the generous donors who have supported this and previous years restoration activities. Work on the front face of the Shrine has been completed. Most impressive is the work completed on the ponds and water features. The photos really do not do it justice.

For the 2024 season, OLWS will have had over 28 tour groups totaling over 1000 visitors. But that number in no way reflects the total number of visitors, many of which just stop by and walk to view the Shrine.

With the intent of enriching the experience for our visitors, we have added audio tours in both English and Arabic to our website. We have also added the stations of the cross and other historical media on our website for visitors to access via their phones or other electronic devices. In the

coming year we hope to be able to make additional languages available.

2025 70th Anniversary—Going National

September 4, 2025, will mark the 70th anniversary of the dedication of **OLWS**. The Parish was part of the Diocese of Saginaw at that time, and the dedication was conducted by Bishop Stephen Woznicki, D.D. who encouraged the people of St. Mary to continue to grow, to work and to pray that the Shrine begun out of a simple devotion to the **Mother of God** may be used as an instrument of **God** in working miracles of Faith, great and small. Quite some time has passed, and OLWS continues to draw both new and returning visitors. The Shrine as a symbol of Faith has been present, quietly reminding us of our Christian roots, the promise of Our Lord and the presence of Our Lady and her continued guidance in our lives if we open ourselves to her and her Holy Son.

As the National Shrine Committee here at OLWS met this past year, one of the early tasks was to clarify a mission statement and define the purpose of OLWS. To that end:

OLWS exists to invite pilgrims to spiritual reflection on the eternal truths that lead to salvation and Mary's role in that plan as an example for each of us. The Shrine is a public expression of the faith community of St. Mary Parish joining in Christian witness to acknowledge Christ the King of the Universe and to honor his mother Mary as our intercessor by offering a place of spiritual refuge and peace, promoting evangelization, and inspiring respect for God's creation.

We believe that this is consistent with the intent and purpose as visualized by Father Hubert Rakowski and the Parishioners of St. Mary Catholic Church and that by becoming a National Shrine OLWS will better achieve it's purpose. By becoming a National Shrine we believe that we will be able to reach a broader audience of pilgrims, that we have not been able to reach before. Father San and representatives of the National Shrine Committee anticipate meeting with Bishop Walsh after Thanksgiving to submit the application package for diocesan review. We ask for your support and prayers as we move forward in the process.

2025 is an anniversary year for both OLWS as well as St Mary – Mio Parish: the year being both the 70th anniversary of the OLWS dedication as well as the 50th anniversary of our present Parish church. Planning of anniversary events will begin this winter. Be sure to check our website for future activities.






CATHOLIC PRACTICES

Do you light devotional candles? Have you ever wondered why? From this early photo in the Holy Family Grotto, you can see that the gtrotto was designed with the intent of providing space for many candles. The following extractions give us a better understanding of the practice.

• Catholics often light candles for an individual. This may be for the soul of a deceased loved one or someone who is sick. Prayers are said for those in need of divine intervention or a divine blessing. Individuals also light prayer candles when seeking divine guidance. The lighting of a votive candle isn't always in a prayer of request. Some Catholics light



a candle in gratitude of blessings bestowed on them. (source: Why Do Catholics Light Candles? Practices and Symbolism | LoveToKnow)

- The Catholic custom of lighting candles has its roots in early Christian times, emerging from the Church teaching that Christ is the Light of the World (see Jn 8:12). "A votive candle really represents our prayer before God," says Fr. Chris Alar, MIC, director of the Association of Marian Helpers. "We join our prayers to the light of Christ, allowing that light to burn on and on in our souls, even when we cannot be in a shrine physically. Christ is the Light of the World, and when we see the light of the candles, we are reminded of that hope." (source: Why Do We Light Candles? | The Divine Mercy)
- Per Msgr. Charles E. Pope votive candles, and other size devotional candles are lit to symbolize prayers or devotion. The candle continues to burn for hours or days (depending on the size) and thus signals the prayer and love of the person who lit it, long after they must go.

Biblically, the root of this practice is the notion of a "burnt offering." In the Old Testament, things of value (usually sacrificed animals) would be burned and thereby offered to God. The smoke was a symbol of the sacrifice of praise ascending to God.

Catholics who light candles are making an offering to God of prayer and praise. The fire of the candle symbolizes ardent love.

The consuming of the candle symbolizes the oblation (offering) of something of value to God: our time, our praise, our resources and so forth. The lingering quality of the candle symbolizes the fact that our prayers, praise and concerns continue in our heart even when we must leave the church. The flickering light also seems to say "Remember me, Lord, remember my prayer and those for whom I pray (source: Why Are Votive Candles Used? | Simply Catholic)

2025 Restoration Activities

With the completion of the front face of the Shrine, activities are turning now to the plaza /patio on the front of the Shrine. Costs for this work are anticipated to be at least twice those of previous stages of activities.

Exploratory work by contractors to verify the construction techniques used has been scheduled for yet this year. In order to minimize the impact to Shrine visitors, we plan to complete the work in one season. To do that we will have to pick up the pace of fundraising activities and ask our generous supporters and **Our Lady** to once again help us meet the 2025 anticipated costs.










Field of Gold
